Chairman 'has undermined trust in BBC'

Richard Sharp's involvement in Johnson loan was a 'serious error of judgment', say MPs

Richard Sharp undermined trust in the BBC and the patrix appoint ments system by failing to reveal his role in facilitating Boris John-

som loan of up to 2000,000, MPs lave said in a damning report. The Digital, Calture, Media and Sport (DCMS) when committee, which approved Sharp's appoint-ment as BBC chairman two years ago, said the failure also constitand a "breach of the standards expected" of individuals applying for public appointments.

Describing it as a "significant error of jadgmeet", the committee urged Starp to "consider the impact his emissions will have on trust in him, the BBC and the puble appointments prisess".

Responding to the report last night, Lucy Powell, the shadow culture societary, said Sharp's position was "increasingly tente able", adding: "It throws into seri-rus doubt the importably and independence that is so funda-

mental to trast in the BBC." The findings are likely to heap pressure on Sharp, who is still availing the outcome of two views of the controversy. The Sonday Times revealed last

month that Sharp, 67, had been involved in discussions leading to

an underlated loss arrangement. of up to ENDO,000 for Johnson while he was prime minister. Sharp was applying to become the chairman of the SDC, and was awarded the role by johnson just weeks later.

In September 2120, Sharp was approached at a dinner party by Sam Blyth, a Caradian Friend and a dotant cousin of Johnson, who told him he wanted to provide assistance to the prime minister because of concernation he was infinancial difficulty. Several months later Blyth and Sharp spole again. Sharp offered

Sharp did not disclose his role either to the appointments panel tasked with voting candidates or the DOMS committee, which held his pre-appointment scratiny hear-ing alter he was announced as the government's preferred candidate

in Jamsary 2020. He also did not dis close that he had told jointson of his intention to apply for the role. johnson later secured a loan facility, which he declared in his internal register of interests as
